Title of policy / procedure / function / project / decision: Public Space Protection Order for Harborough District Council

A Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) allows a local authority to introduce a series of measures into a defined area. The proposed PSPO will bring in measures to control and restrict certain activities, in particular new and enhanced powers to tackle dog fouling and other forms of irresponsible dog ownership, and replace the existing Designated Public Place Orders (DPPO) which restricts the consumption of alcohol in a public place in designated areas.

This is a legal order that can last for up to three years and it will prohibit a number of activities. If an element of this order is breached, the outcome could be that the individual is issued with a fixed penalty notice for £100 or fined up to a maximum of £1000 if at court.

The Regulatory Committee agreed at its meeting on the 27 October 2015 that they wanted to progress a consultation on a proposal to introduce a Public Space Protection Order for Harborough District Council. This proposed introducing measures to tackle dog fouling and other forms of irresponsible dog ownership, and replace the existing Designated Public Place Orders (DPPO) which restricts the consumption of alcohol in a public place in designated areas i.e. Harborough and Lutterworth Town Centres. The public consultation was held between the 16 November to 29 December 2015. The outcome of which was presented to the Regulatory Services Committee on the 15 March 2016. Further consultation was undertaken with Elected Members from Market Harborough and Lutterworth.
